#### Co-Chairs Article

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For those of you who attended the 39th convention, "Diversity is our strength" in Washington, DC, you will recall that we announced at the closing banquet a beguest from the estate of longtime member Ken Pavlick. Since that time, a committee was formed and led by Dr. Preston Shumaker and Steve Ball with the assistance of Steve McGehee and the co-chairs. The committee reviewed suggestions from members and came up with their own recommendations. At the October 2019 board meeting in Long Beach, CA, the board unanimously voted to accept the committee recommendations and created two new scholarships available for the next 5 years.

These new KPBF scholarships are intended to reduce

the cost of attending convention and expose and remind the community of our organization. The first scholarship, called U35, is geared towards people 35 and under. The convention registration rate for these people is reduced to \$50! The second scholarship, called FIRST, is geared toward first time convention attendees or those who have not attended an NABWMT convention in 10 years or more. We believe the reduced registration fee will help people take a chance and attend our conventions. To register for convention using these new scholar-



## MEDIA COMM 2019 REVIEW

We celebrate our commitment to bring our members, friends and allies the best media presence to enhance our statement of purpose. In our final video cast of the year we note our achievements of 2019.

We launched our upgraded NA aural Podcasts midyear to include some video presentations to make our messages more visual. This podcast is designed to reflect the urgency of our times. 22 podcasts were made during 2019.

We are in a very difficult and threatening times and events are undermining and attacking our values in our country and lives. We have an administration that has removed or rolled back historic gains in laws protecting the communities of color, queer people and hurting many at the margins. Never before have our right to vote been so overtly and forcibly suppressed and gerrymandered. Our committee will continue to keep you all updated.

Meanwhile we were happy to work with the B. CHAMBERS FUND organizers which recognizes LGBTQ students for their scholastic achievement and making a significant impact in their communities. Since the fund's inception, nearly \$20,000 have been awarded.

And just as exciting the NABWMT was the fortunate benefactor of The Ken Pavlick Bequest which a select committee used this Fund is to ensure the robust and vibrant development of the NABWMT 2020 through 2030. The Media Committee developed the web portals to attract younger (under 35), first timers, and "returning" (after 10 years), attendees to the Convention.

Within The NA Media Committee we started a program to help our members and allies to vote for the candidate of their choice in the midterm 2018 elections. We did this to emphasize our collective values. Working with our consultants, we developed a 2020 program to tell all that we believe that no life is worth less or more than any other life based upon race, sex, sexual orientation, gender or gender expression, color, age, or geographic origin. This program led to the development of a phone banking methodology to contact our members with voting information for the 2020 General Election. Our main website hosts a voter guide.

In the social media arena, we curated over 13,000 members of our main Facebook page providing careful oversight. Likewise, our fledgling political action Facebook was developed to provide a space for education on the state of our values.

In accordance with our Standing rules which state, in part, that "The NABWMT will publish an electronic publication at least quarterly that shall contain news of the organization.." we provided a notable upgrade with digital online access of our Q-Vision newsletter.

The media committee hosted or assisted online presences of information for California, Arizona, Wisconsin and of course that nation at large with our main site: nabwmt.org.

We still support Email Blasts by Mail Chimp where our audience allowed us to exceed sector average "opens" at 28%.

Finally we are grateful for the support of many people this year. First, the NA co chairs Scott and Gavin, who are great boosters of our work. We recognize also, fellow Media Committee member Mark and Media consultants Irwin, Tim. Steve, Mack, Kirk, and many more including the NA Board members. Our work is made possible by you all.

From our Philadelphia Chapter

"A Call to Arms: Name Change or Not to Change" Tyrone Harvey, PACT Member

It hit me first on May...2019, the date of our last Anniversary celebration which was held at JNA Caterers on Broad St. I knew it would be a momentous occasion, but really didn't understand the true impact until later. As we went through the usual exchange of pleasantries, greeting old friends, reflecting on memories of the past as I had not seen most of them for many moons, we settled into our seats and the first glance of the program immediately caught my attention. There it was, P-A-C-T Philadelphia. Whoa! Were my eyes deceiving me? Was there an egregious error made by the printer that somehow slipped by the watchful eye of our top notch quality assurance (Anniversary) team? Or was it true that a name change had officially been made to the organization which I had been associated with since 1994, formerly known as MACT-Philadelphia? Much to my shock and dismay, it was the latter. As my mind shook in disbelief, I sat in silence trying to hold my emotions in check but felt as if someone had just whispered in my ear, "you're no longer in Kansas, Dorothy!" As I reflected on past efforts

To move the organization in that direction, I recalled the passionate pleas which were made in attempts to bring the group to a better understanding of the fact that (1) membership, while technically good, was stagnant and needed to grow; (2) that our organization and statement of purpose was not embraced by the newer or younger generations, as times had changed and they did not face the same challenges; and (3) that there was a need to partner with other organizations, in order to remain relevant in the new LGBTQ landscape. Nonetheless, the evening continued and the festivities included the awarding of special honours to Amber Hikes, Philadelphia LGBT Liaison. Ms. Hikes addressed the group, giving accolades and kudos to the group for work over the years as well as its progression towards inclusivity with the recent name change.

It took me back to the days when individuals like Mandy Carter were connected to our national organization and when a woman from the Philadelphia area was elected to serve on the Board of Directors. I engaged in some discussion with the members seated at my table and it seemed as if everyone, including the city's appointed LGBT leadership were in support of the name change and held a positive impression as to the path that was being taken. I got the impression that no one wanted to "rock the boat" so to speak, so I left the event with a positive outlook and feeling hopeful for the organization's future and the name change. Afterwards, my thoughts centered on how things in the organization had changed and I was forced to begin thinking about my involvement with the organization, which had been minimal for some time prior to then. I realized that while the organization was pivotal to my coming "out" and into the self that I am, I hadn't maintained my connections to the group nor its mission, as I once had. Yes, life was happening with, within and around me and in many ways had taken me further away from the organization—I hadn't been attending social events, political activities and had infrequent personal interaction directly with members of the group.

I didn't revisit my thoughts on the matter again until attending the national convention in Washington, DC. I am not sure if it was the fact that a group of us was again together or if it was weighing heavily on my mind, but the mere mention of a name change on the national level ignited conversations about our local organization, as one of the last surviving chapters in the National Association. It was there that new facts and understandings came to light and a culmination of divergent thoughts and surrounding circumstances regarding the current status of the organization were revealed. At that time, we were not able to fully discuss what had taken place in the wake of the name change nor to develop a plan of action as to how we would be moving forward, but it did signal that regardless of the "name" of the organization, there was work to be done to address some of the concerns that still existed within the group.

At our November, 2019 general membership meeting, the sirens of alarm as to the organization's future AND the current name change rang loud and clear. As we waited in vain for our speaker to arrive, thoughts of the name change entered the conversation and shaped the exchange of personal stories that were shared by those in attendance. Members shared thoughts as to their reasons for joining the organization and what they would like to see and receive in return as a result of involvement; what other organizations offer by way of benefits; what participation entails and how those things keep us motivated to continue membership. While these things are truly important and will ultimately shape which organizations we choose to become involved with and remain attached to, there must also be accountability by membership that there is a reciprocal responsibility that they have to the organization for maintaining its standards and continuation.

It is this sort of deep searching that each member will need to undergo and the type of commitment required at the table, during public events and behind the scenes to continue to operate as an organization. Therefore, this is a call to arms for all Philadelphia soldiers who believe in the statement of purpose and mission of our organization to commit themselves on January 17th in collaboration and partnership to assemble the building blocks in place to maintain what we have together, regardless of the name we choose or have chosen for ourselves.

### A selection from our video cast and podcast series

proken Justice: This video cast topic is an update on the roots of mass incarceration and the Broken Justice system.

Slavery: I know that our viewers understand that the first enslaved people were sold in Jamestown, in 1619. This started centuries of oppression of people at the margins. And you know that America and the White House were built by slaves. And that white Americans profited from forced Black labor.

Im Crow: In 1865, slavery ended, but oppression did not. Enter the so called "Jim Crow" era which effectively legalized segregation in all aspects of American life, for the next 100 years and brought terror against Black people, intended to maintain the status quo. It wasn't until the 1960s, with the passage of the Voting Rights and Fair Housing acts that the Jim Crow era officially ended. In the housing boom of the 1950s, as white America began building wealth in the suburbs, Black people, were deliberately and systematically shut out, a method called "redlining". While the law made redlining illegal, racism in the mortgage industry didn't go away.

Similarly, the end of slavery didn't stop former slave holders from thinking of Black people as slaves. The 13th Amendment outlawed slavery, but left a loophole known as "except as punishment for crime." States throughout the former Confederacy immediately began drafting laws guaranteed to lead to the arrest of Black people. The roots of today's mass incarceration are in those laws.

There's a direct line from slavery to the fact that the average Black family has only 10 % for every dollar held by the average white family. And, while blacks are only 13% of the overall population, they make up 40% of the prison population Slavery's impact is felt every single day by African Americans.

The results of a national research by the Open Society Institute,, say that most Americans believe the country's criminal justice system comprises an ineffective, purely punitive approach to crime.

ass Incarceration Americans want to attack the causes of crime rather than the

symptoms;

the 50 states are running budget deficits. Given a choice of six budget areas that could be reduced to help states balance the budget, the public places spending on prisons at the top of their list, tied with transportation. Americans would take the budget axe to prisons much more quickly than to childcare for working families, security against terrorism, education and job training, or healthcare. Hispanics and blue-collar workers are among the strongest supporters of cutbacks in prison spending

The War on Drugs Many non-violent offenders are receiving prison sentences that are counterproductive and unduly harsh. Americans describe drug abuse as a medical problem that should be handled mainly through counselling and treatment. According to the research, Americans believe that today's prisons are no more than "warehouses," providing little or no rehabilitation or re-entry programs, that instead simply store criminals for a period of time and then dump them back on the street, no different than when they were first incarcerated.

Changing Views on Mandatory Sentencing The public has now turned against previously popular mandatory sentences, such as "three strikes" provisions.

Prevention is Nation's #1 Criminal Justice Goal Americans see prevention as the most important function of the criminal justice system, and also the function that is most sorely lacking. Several groups rank after-school activities ahead of values education as the best way to prevent crime. The preventive measure perceived to be most effective at reducing crime is character education—teaching young people personal responsibility and moral values.

- ★The best way to reduce crime is to effectively rehabilitate prisoners by requiring education and job training so that once released

The Prison Industrial Complex This refers to the overlapping interests of the government and private companies in mass incarceration, and the fundamental relationship between punishment and commerce. it was born in the '80s, when the War on Drugs was enacted in full force under President Reagan. We send more people to prison than any other nation on Earth, and people of color make up most of that incarcerated population.

ere are five ways the prison-industrial complex functions as a new, legal form of slavery.

- ★Incarcerated individuals are legally "The Property Of The Government"
- ★Prisoners are leased to private companies for mandatory labor
- ★Prisoners work and live In Inhumane conditions
- ★Prisoners are paid next to nothing while corporations profit huge amounts
- ★The system dehumanizes Incarcerated Individuals

In her book The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration and the Age of Colour-blindness, legal scholar and civil rights advocate Michelle Alexander calls life after prison a parallel to the slavery and Jim Crow era, "in which discrimination in nearly every aspect of social, political, and economic life is perfectly legal."NEWS

We can't ever hope to effectively fight systemic racism or transform our broken criminal justice system if we don't truly understand why and how things got to be the way they are. The future of this country depends on our ability to embrace the truth about our collective history, even the parts that make us want to look away. And NABWMT will always be there to educate and inform

# Future NABWMT Conventions By Scott Duty

The board of directors, convention managers and convention planning committee are all hard at work putting together our 40th annual convention in New Orleans, LA later this year.

## 2021 Minneapolis, MN

It might be hard to imagine, but work has already begun for the 41st convention in Minneapolis, MN and the 42nd convention in Atlanta, GA. The work is preliminary – site selection, convention theme and the like have already begun. Our host hotel will be the Crowne Plaza Northstar in downtown Minneapolis.

As we discussed convention locations over the past few years, Minneapolis was repeatedly mentioned. If you have not been there before, you are in for a treat. I have been fortunate enough to travel to the greater Minneapolis area many times with my work. These trips have exposed me to what is known as "Minnesota Nice." A wonderfully accepting people, politeness and gratitude abound.

Minneapolis has a vibrant downtown area with lots of shopping, restaurants and bars that thrives on diversity. Not just diversity in sexuality, but also as a place that embraces the many nationalities that have made the Minneapolis/St. Paul/Bloomfield areas home.

This diversity happened quite by accident. The area is home to a world-class airport that used to be a hub for Northwest Airlines (before being acquired by Delta Airlines). Immigrants from Africa would fly to Northwest Airlines to America and many stayed in the city where they landed.

The area is also home to the Mall of America – the largest shopping mall in the United States complete with an indoor roller coaster! Several years ago, a light rail system was completed. With stops located throughout downtown and out to the suburbs, you can get from downtown to the airport in about 20 minutes or the Mall of America in about 30 minutes for \$2.50. The train even has Wi-Fi.
